Celebrating Indigenous Peoples' Day

On Indigenous Peoples' Day, we honor America's Tribal Nations and celebrate the many

Indigenous communities and cultures that thrive today. In 2021, the White House issued a proclamation to observe the second Monday of October as a day to celebrate their invaluable contributions and recognize their inherent sovereignty. We are continuing work through our SAMHSA projects to support Indigenous communities by enhancing SOAR services and other supports across Indian Country. In communities like mine in Eastern Oklahoma, enhancing financial security can mean

the difference between surviving and thriving. Currently, 1 in 3 Native individuals live in poverty. Growing up Cherokee, I've been privileged as my Nation has found its financial

foothold after displacement and endeavored to offer its citizens state-of-the-art healthcare facilities, affordable housing, language revitalization, and scholarships to encourage higher education. For me, these are examples of how endless the possibilities are, both for the individual and for the community, when we're able to care for ourselves and each other. In recognition of this day, I spent the day in my community playing traditional games, eating frybread, and feeling grateful for the resilience and beauty found in Indigenous people. $\Box\Box$, Wado,


